The narrator, Dr. Ken Connolly, gave us the history about those who were willing to be tortured and killed rather than give up their efforts to get the Bible into the common person's hand and language. ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH COUNCIL OF TOULOUSE - 1229 A.D

After the death of Pope Innocent III (1216 AD), the Synod of Toulouse directed in 1229 its fourteenth canon against the misuse of Sacred Scripture on the part of the laymen: "prohibemus, ne libros Veteris et Novi Testamenti laicis permittatur habere" (Hefele, "Concilgesch", Freiburg, 1863, V, 875).

"Canon 14. We prohibit also that the laity [common person – not educated in Latin] should be permitted to have the books of the Old or New Testament;
...we **most strictly forbid** their having any translation of these books."

ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH COUNCIL OF TARRAGONA - 1234 A.D

The Council of Tarragona of 1234, in its second canon, ruled that: **"No one may possess the books of the Old and New Testaments in the Romance language, and if anyone possesses them he must turn them over to the local bishop within eight days after promulgation of this decree, so that they may be burned...."**

ROMAN CATHOLIC CHURCH COUNCIL OF TRENT

Pope Pius IV had a list of the forbidden books compiled and officially prohibited them in the Index of Trent (Index Librorum Prohibitorum) of 1559. This is an excerpt :

"Whoever reads or has such a translation in his possession... cannot be absolved from his sins until he has turned in these Bibles...Books in the vernacular dealing with the controversies between Catholics and the heretics [Catholics branded anyone who was exposing the Catholic lies as, "heretics"] of our time are not to be generally permitted, but

are to be handled in the **same way as Bible translations...**"
